The DfE says...

Relationships Education

Relationships Education will put in place the building blocks needed for positive and safe relationships, including with family, friends and online.

Your child will be taught what a relationship is, what friendship is, what family means and who can support them. In an age-appropriate way, your child's school will cover how to treat each other with kindness, consideration and respect. By the end of primary school, pupils will have been taught content on:

- · families and people who care for me
- caring friendships
- respectful relationships
- online relationships
- being safe

At Meadowfield we have thought carefully about how we teach children about healthy relationships and use the Personal, Social and Health Education (PSHE) curriculum to support this.

In all year groups pupils will...

- Learn about positive, healthy relationships and unhealthy relationships
- Learn about how to be a good friend
- Learn what abusive behavior is and the communication skills to speak out about it
- Learn to listen and develop confidence when talking about feelings and relationships
- Learn about how to make informed decisions about their lives
- Learn about where other people come from, their religions, abilities, likes and dislikes
- Learn to solve difference in relationships with restorative practice
- Learn about a range of different relationships, including LGBT+ relationships
